LABOR ASKED TO REMAIN LOYAL

Interior Alterations Started; Plan to Remodel and Make Front Uniform

Extensive interior alterations have been started in the main building of Dives, Pomeroy and Stewart department store. Pomraning, the contractor, who will have charge of the remodeling.
