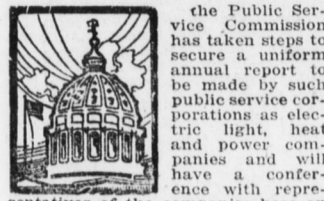


REPORTS WILL BE STANDARDIZED

Public Service Commission Fixes a Hearing in Proposition For Statements



The Public Service Commission has taken steps to secure a uniform annual report to be made by such public service corporations as electric light, heat and power companies and will have a conference with representatives of the companies here on June 6.

The commission has scheduled hearings for every day of the coming week except Tuesday when it will meet in executive session in this city for consideration of cases.
