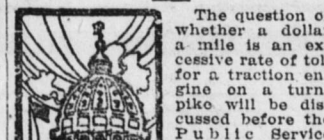

TRACTION RATE TO BE DISCUSSED

Toll Roads Will Have Chance to Tell Why a Dollar a Mile Is Charged Engines



The question of whether a dollar a mile is an excessive rate of toll for a traction engine on a turnpike will be discussed before the Public Service Commission here next Monday, the complaint having arisen in Lancaster.

Hearings will be held in Harrisburg and Wilkes-Barre during the week, the Harrisburg hearings being on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, while the Wilkes-Barre hearings will be on Monday and Tuesday.

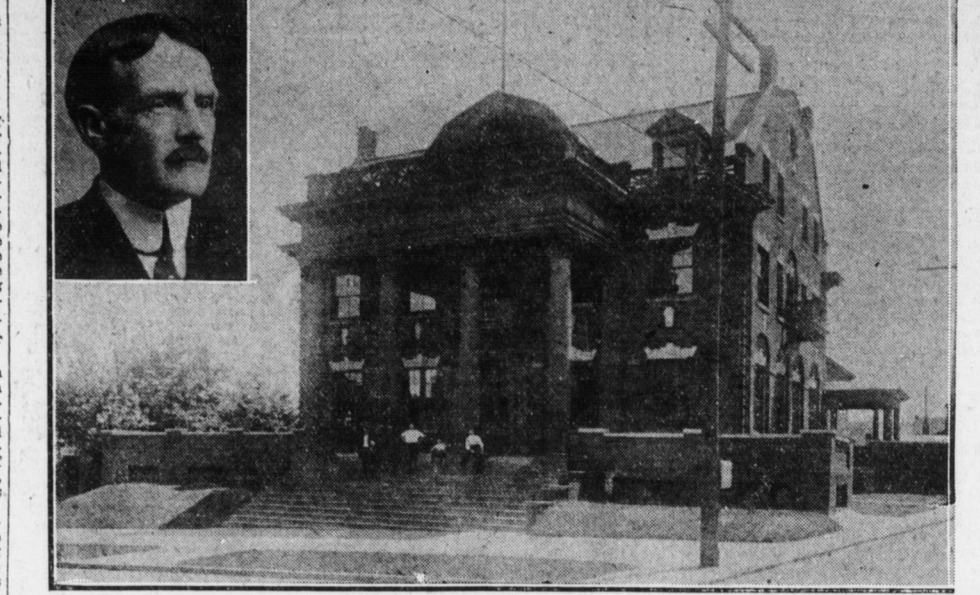

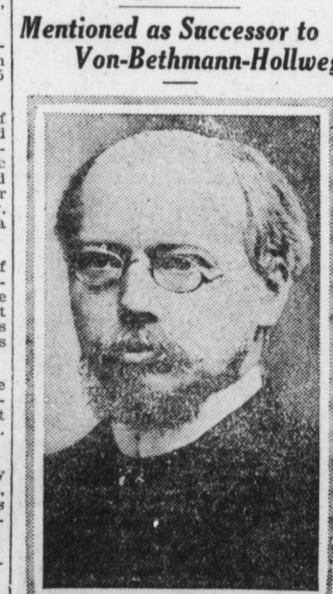
Harrisburg's association is 28 years old to-morrow. The first building was at Sixth and Cumberland streets.
