Training Men

Washington, May 21.—A practical method of national service whereby famous football and baseball players, physical instructors and athletes with their special skill and knowledge has been provided through the committee on training camp activities recently appointed by Secretary Baker with Raymond B. Fosdick as chairman.

After a study of Canadian and British army training systems, Mr. Fosdick has found that all athletic sports and even children's games

sports and even children's games have a distinct place in military work and give the soldier the iron muscles he needs in the hand to hand fighting of trench warfare.

To Feature Baseball

Baseball will be the feature of the efforts of the committee. Extensive organization of divisional leagues and championship competitions that probably will include a national pennant race, will be encouraged by the committee and supported by officers in command of the camps.

Similar organization for other sports will also be perfected. Men of flational reputation as ball players or athletic trainers will be assigned to each camp to instruct and aid the soldier players.

Another feature of the recreational programs will be bayonet competitions.

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
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
