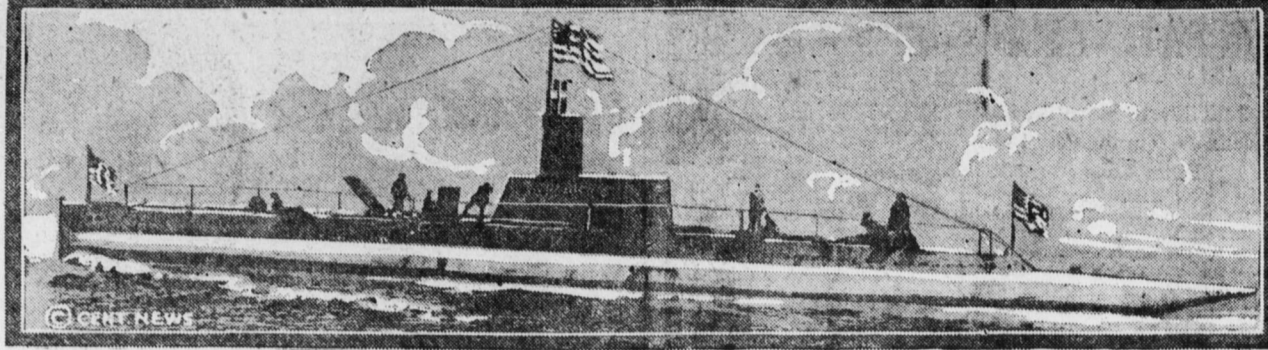
Bills Pending Affect Harrisburg; May Have Tax For Industrial Promotion

NO ATTENTION TO ROAD ORDER

Turnpike Company Said to Have Ignored Ruling of Service Commission

Officials of the Motor Club of Lebanon complained of the Berks and Dauphin turnpike by a news item in this newspaper of yesterday's issue, pointed out to-day that the turnpike company has disregarded absolutely the order of the Public Service Commission.

The Motor Club brought charges against the turnpike company and which followed the Public Service Commission issued the following order: NOW, to wit, September 21, 1916, the Berks and Dauphin Turnpike Company is ordered to so improve its turnpike that the macadamized portions of its traveled roadway shall not be less than twenty-one feet in width at any point that this portion shall be properly graded and drained on the sides to obviate the ponding length shall be properly graded and drained on the sides to obviate the ponding up at any time of water on or along the turnpike; that proper guard fences or walls shall be provided at all places where such protection is necessary or desirable; that the turnpike shall be straightened and relocated at or near tollgate No. 8 in North Lebanon and South Lebanon townships to obviate the dangerous curves there, and that plans and specifications for the permanent improvement of the turnpike in substantial conformity with these requirements, and the purpose as expressed in the company's answer to the complaints shall be prepared and submitted to the commission for its approval, and that when such plans and specifications are approved, modified or amended by the commission that the company shall forthwith proceed accordingly and make the changes and improvements.

And it is ordered that the seventeen miles of the turnpike between western boundary of Palmyra in Lebanon county from the Dauphin county line to including the eastern boundary of Myerstown, in Lebanon county, shall be completed on or before the first day of July, 1917, and that the completion of the turnpike shall be completed on or before July 1, 1918, and that repairs shall at once be made, reasonable in extent and character, on that portion of the turnpike between Myerstown and Wernersville.

Motor club officials say little or no attention has been paid to this order and that the company has placed itself in the position of ignoring an order of the Public Service Commission, for which there are severe penalties.

Russian Workers Say They Cannot Support Allied War Program

London, May 22.—The Petrograd correspondent of the Daily Express says a series of important negotiations is impending between Russia and her allies, on the question of a revision of war aims as outlined in the replies of the allies to President Wilson. Foreign Minister Terestchenko discussed the matter with the allied ambassadors on Saturday.

The correspondent says Russia, in her negotiations, will try to define precisely its desire for peace without annexations or contributions and will make clear that the Russian workers, while not desiring a separate peace, cannot support the allies in their present war program.

Russ Delegates to Hold General War Congress

Petrograd, May 22.—The executive committee of the council of soldiers and workmen's delegates has issued a call for a general congress on June 14 of representatives of all branches of the council throughout Russia and of the various military organizations. The congress will discuss national defense, peace conditions, and labor problems.
