at the Altoona shops and 30 at the Baldwin Locomotive Works, Philadelphila.

The Altoona shops, in addition to constructing 245 locomotives for the Lines East, on the 1918 program, have uncompleted orders for 180 on the 1917 program, and will also build 30 heavy passenger engines, for the Lines West, during the present year. This brings the total locomotives at present on order at Altoona to 455, a number more than sufficient to keep the locomotive shop running to fullest capacity during the remainder of the present year and during the fear 1918.

It was also announced yesterday that orders had been received at the Baldwin works for fifty locomotives for the British War Office, three for the British War Office, three for the British War Office, three for the United States Government and one for the Porvenir Sugar Company, of Cuba. These 56 engines will cost \$4,000,000.
