## WAR TAX BILL

As passed by the House, 329 to 76, after two weeks' debate, the bill as after two weeks' debate, the bill as originally drawn to raise \$1,800,000,000,000 was changed essentially only in these four ways: Surtaxes on incomes above \$40,000 were raised about 25 per cent; slight reductions were made in the proposed second-class mail rates; provision for a 5 per cent, tax on all advertising, except newspaper and periodical, was eliminated; and print paper and pulp, gold, sliver and a few other articles were exempted from the proposed tariff of 10 per cent, on goods now admitted free.
