All Commencement Exercises Will Be Crowded Into Three Days

Carlisle, Pa., May 28.—Announcement was made to-day of the honor winners at Dickinson College. A Carlisle girl, Miss Nora Mohler, secures valedictory honors, while Robert L. Myers Jr., Camp Hill, is awarded an oration for scholarship.

Commencement activities begin on Friday evening, a new plan being inaugurated this year, that of a "week-end commencement." All exercises are crowded into three days in order to give alumni and others a chance to be here for all of them. On Friday evening a college dance and various fraternal activities will hold attention; Saturday morning will be given over to class reunions and in the afternoon the class day exercises will be held, with the glee club concert and junior prom in the evening. On Sunday, Dr. J. H. Morgan will preach the baccalaureate sermon and in the evening a joint meeting of religious organizations will be held, to be conducted by alumni here. On Monday morning the graduation exercises of the college and school of law will be held, the whole to close with the alumni luncheon. A feature will be the dedication of the new ornamental gate, given by the class of 1904.
