Washington, D. C., May 29.—Captain Charles Sweeney, late of the French army.—'Sweeney of the Foreign Legion'—yesterday was commissioned a major in the United States army. Major Sweeney will be detailed to duty at the officers training camp, Fort Myer, Va.

Major Sweeney was at West Point from 1900 to 1903. He has served as an instructor in France. Major Sweeney returned to Washington Sunday after an absence of ten days, during which he delivered a series of lectures on the European war, and found yesterday that a commission was ready for him. It is believed probable that Major Sweeney will be detailed to duty at first one camp and then another.
