Help Scarce at Enola; Men Leave to Join Army Every day the labor situation in the Enola yards becomes more acute, according to officials in charge. At present the transportation department is more than 100 men short, and the conditions are the same in the motive power branch. The high wages paid by the munitions works and other manufacturing plants is blamed for the scarcity of the motive power branch. The shortage of a number of the employees are leaving the company, especially during the last two weeks. The Enola yards have been brought to the attention of the national service. During the last six months large numbers of southern negroes and Mexicans have been attracted to Enola, but they also are attracted by the high wages paid by other concerns.
