

BIG SURVEY OF FORESTED LANDS

Forty Thousand Acres Are to Be Looked Over by the State's Agents

The State Forestry Commission has ordered surveys and examinations of 40,000 acres of forested land in Clearfield, Elk, Cameron and adjoining counties which have been offered for sale to the State for the purpose of reserving them as State forest reserves.

Most of the State purchases for reserves and its taking over of properties under the auxiliary act are being carried with an idea of protecting water supplies.

National Guard Changes—Major Abel H. MacReynolds, Doylestown, Pa., was appointed major in the Sixth Infantry.

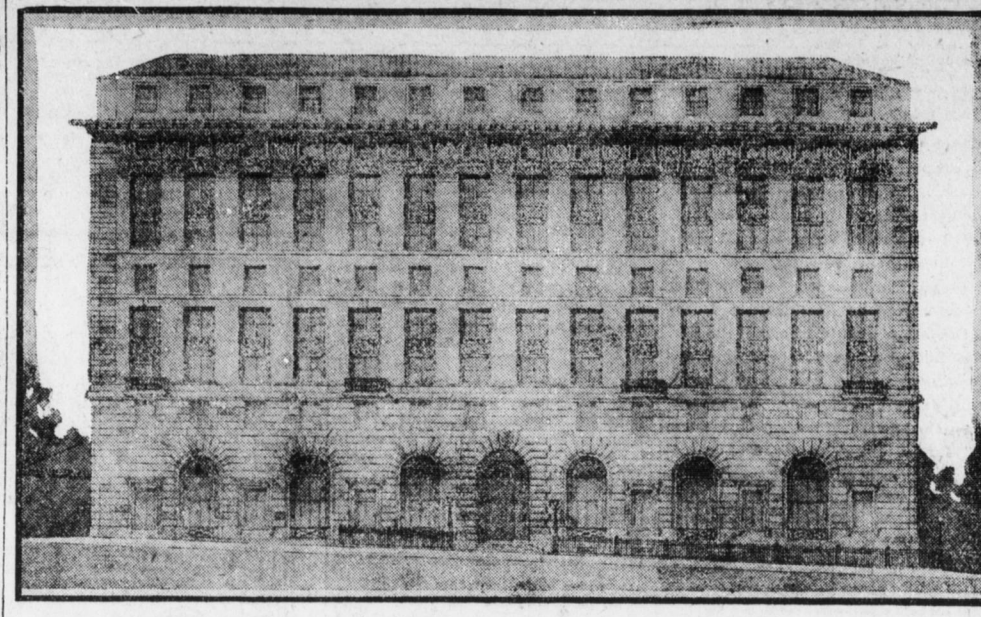
