MANY ACTIVITIES AT MASONIC HOME

Memorial Day fittingly observed; playgrounds opened. Activities at the Masonic Home, Elizabethtown, during the last week were many and varied.

The community of the home includes among the guests veterans of the Civil War of 1861 as well as one of the Mexican War of 1846, most of whom are members of the Grand Army of the Republic. It, therefore, was proper that Memorial Day should be fittingly observed by the home.
