London, June 6.—Sixteen German airplanes came over the North Sea last evening and dropped many bombs on the small towns and villages in Essex and Kent. Only fourteen of them returned to their home base, for two were brought down by British guns.

So far as late reports show, only two persons were killed and twenty-nine injured in the bombarded districts. The raiders met with a lively reception, extra precautions having been taken by the British authorities after the recent very serious raid on the southeast coast of England, in which 250 persons were killed or wounded. 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
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
