

STOCK RECORDS ARE BESTED IN MARKETS

Wave of Bullish Enthusiasm Sweeps Exchange, Carrying Most of Leading Industrials to New High Records; Rails Neglected

New York, June 7. (Wall Street) Another wave of bullish enthusiasm swept over the stock market at the beginning of today's operations, carrying most of the leading industrials to highest prices of the year since establishing new records in several noteworthy instances.

United States Steel's first transaction of 16,500 shares at 12 1/2 to 13 1/4 was a record for the steel stock.

Other notable advances were made by Bethlehem Steel, new and old shares, rose 2 and 3 points respectively.

Industrial alcohol added 3 points to yesterday's rise and other war supply issues were higher by 1 to 3 points.

Losses were generally neglected and little changed.

Gains were materially extended in the broad demand of the morning, total dealings approximating 750,000 shares.

British Headquarters in France, (From a Staff Correspondent of the Associated Press), June 7, via London.—The British rush this morning on the Messines-Wytschaete ridge of the Belgian front took them well over the ridge where they are now entrenched.

The village of Messines was reported to have been taken early in the fighting. It was also reported that Lenfer and Zareeba had fallen and that Wytschaete had been surrounded by the British storming troops.
