

PENNSYLVANIANS PRAISED IN CAMP

'Extraordinary Fine Group of Men' Said to Be at Fort Niagara

Fort Niagara, N. Y., June 7. — High tribute has been paid to the physique and mentality of the Pennsylvanians in training here for commissions in the officers reserve corps by Lieutenant Colonel John W. Heavy, in charge of the instruction of the men. Colonel Heavy said he did not think that more than fifty men now in camp would be dismissed for physical and mental incapacity. This, in view of announcements from other training camps that from 500 to 1,000 are to be let out, shows the men from Pennsylvania to be of excellent physique and also that they have been chosen with rare care as to their mental fitness.

"They are an extraordinarily fine group of men," the officer said, "and I am proud to be connected with their instruction. Their quick grasping of the fundamentals of military training, their willingness in drilling and their

earnest efforts at study have been a great source of pleasure to the officers of the army connected with this camp. I have no doubt but that a large majority will acquit themselves with signal honor when called upon to face the common foe."

It was also stated that there is every reason to believe that more than forty-five men from each company will qualify at the examinations, which are to be held at the conclusion of the three months' training.

Work was started yesterday on the operating building, which is to be part of the hospital equipment. This building will be equipped with the most modern instruments and surgical appliances, including a complete X-ray outfit. This outfit has already been shipped, and should arrive in a few days. A mess hall for the hospital corps is also under construction. The hospital is separate and distinct from the other departments, and the buildings are all situated on a little hill, remote from the other buildings, and overlooking Lake Ontario.

The basketball and volleyball tournaments which have been organized will be started Saturday. These, with baseball, the pentathlon and other games, will give the athletes in camp about all the activities they want.

"That the commissary department is a busy one and the problem of feeding 2,500 hungry soldiers is no inconsiderable matter," the officer said, "is shown by the following stores which must be served daily: Potatoes, 3,000 pounds; sugar, 500 pounds; tea, 200 pounds; coffee, 200 pounds; bread, 1,500 pounds; condensed milk, 122 cans. This is only a part of the stores which are used daily, nor does it include the fruit for breakfast, the 'second vegetable' or the dessert.

Great German Fortress Capitulates Before the Government's Authority

Petrograd, June 7. — The Kronstadt incident is closed. The local committee of soldiers' and workmen's delegates has recognized the authority of the provisional government.

The local committee of the workmen's and soldiers' delegates at Kronstadt decided on June 1 to assume control of the great fortress and to refuse recognition of the provisional government. The government officials forward a program of splitting Russia up into a great number of self-governing communities and sent missionaries out to try to persuade neighboring towns to join them. The Socialist ministers in the provisional cabinet, Mr. Tsereteli and Skobeleff, went to Kronstadt from Petrograd and endeavored to persuade the seceders to abandon their plan. The present surrender is apparently a result of their arguments.

GRADE PRINCIPAL ELECTED
Mount Union, Pa., June 7. — Ivan Houck, of Orisona, for the past three years principal of the school at Mill Creek, has been elected principal of the grade schools of Mount Union. Mr. Houck will have charge of the Market street school building, including ten teachers and the first five grades.

ACTIVE CHURCH WORKER DIES

Frederick W. Liesmann, Publisher of Pennsylvania Staats-Zeitung



After an illness of six years, Frederick W. Liesmann, aged 71, editor and publisher of the Pennsylvania Staats-Zeitung for twenty-seven years, died last night at his home at Camp Hill. He was one of the oldest and best known residents of this part of the state.

After four weeks ago he became confined to his bed and since that time has gradually grown weaker.

He was born in Cologne, Germany, October 28, 1845, the seventh son of Christoph and Margaretha Liesmann. In accordance with an old German custom the seventh son was named after the king then reigning, King Frederick Wilhelm.

Active Church Worker
Mr. Liesmann came to this country during July, 1864. After landing in New York he came to Harrisburg to the home of his brother, the Rev. Herman Liesmann, who was then pastor at St. Michael's German Lutheran Church. May 24, 1868, he married Anna Mary, eldest daughter of J. George Ripper, founder of the Pennsylvania Staats-Zeitung. After the death of his father-in-law he purchased the paper which he edited and published until late November.

An active worker in all church affairs, he was superintendent of St. Michael's Sunday school for thirty-eight years. He taught a Bible class of seventy-five members for eighteen years. He was connected with several building associations in this city and a director of the Emmaus Orphan Home at Middletown.

He is survived by a wife, five daughters, Mrs. John Brown, of this city; Mrs. Edward Shisler, Camp Hill; Jennie, Marie and Clara, at home, two sons, George W. and William and five grandchildren.

TRY TO OBTIATE HOMESICKNESS

Raising Fund to Equip Clubhouse For Soldiers Back of French Front

Have you ever been homesick? Have you ever been in a foreign land and seized with utter loneliness when you couldn't speak the language used about you and where everyone from your native town seemed a near relative, and where anyone from your own State was immediately a close friend?

To obviate such homesickness among Pennsylvania soldiers in France the Emergency Aid of Pennsylvania has made an appeal to the residents of Philadelphia and the State of Pennsylvania to contribute \$10,000 for the purpose of equipping a clubhouse for Pennsylvania soldiers "somewhere in France" where they will find home comforts and cheer on their way to and from the firing line.

The Young Men's Christian Association is raising a fund to establish such centers in England and France, and the Emergency Aid, composed of prominent women throughout Penn-

sylvania, wants to equip one of those centers. The clubhouse will offer a place in which the soldiers may spend their time while on duty, write their letters, receive letters and otherwise be made comfortable and relieved from the terrible strain of the front line trenches.

Dangers of the battlefield are not the only risks that threaten a soldier. His spare time is beset with pitfalls and the Emergency Aid wants to save him as much as possible. Fathers and mothers all over the State are pouring in their donations because it is one of the few things they can do for their soldiers. Contributions for the fund should be sent to Mrs. Barclay H. Russian Treaties With Entente Said to Have Been Stolen in Petrograd

Amsterdam, June 7. — The Hamburger Fremdenblatt, a copy of which has been received here, published a Stockholm report which is alleged to have emanated from Russian sources, that the original treaties between Russia and western powers which were concluded since 1913 have disappeared from the Petrograd foreign office.

The rumor connects the disappearance of the treaties with "recent mysterious burglaries at the foreign office and in foreign embassies in the Russian capital."

Signal Corps Recruiting Campaign Is Successful

The recruiting office for the Signal Enlisted Reserve Corps at 121 South Fifth street, Philadelphia, has been besieged with applicants since its opening on Saturday, June 2. Over sixty men have been examined and enrolled during the first two days. The greater part of these are experienced telegraph and radio operators, wiremen on telephone and telegraph lines and those familiar with the various branches of electricity. There is an urgent need for these men and at the present rate at which the applicants are pouring in, the chances for getting in this part of the service will not be open for a very great length of time.

There are a great number of non-commissioned officers positions open for those who are adapted to this line of work. One who is an expert operator, either wire or radio, or an expert electrical man, would do well in applying for admission to the signal corps. Only 500 men are needed from the eastern part of Pennsylvania.

This branch of the service is mounted and covers an extremely broad field, and the work required is varied and diversified. All men between the ages of 18 and 45 years who have had electrical experience

are liable. They must, however, weigh at least 120 pounds and be 5 feet 4 inches in height. There are also a few positions open for men familiar with automobiles, motorcycles and horses.

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Airplane Fleet Bombards New York With Liberty Loan Bond Applications

New York, June 7. — An aerial bombardment of bombs of literature designed to rouse those who have not subscribed to the Liberty Loan, was the feature of the subscription campaign here to-day. Twenty aircraft, under command of Captain Walter G. Kilmer, U. S. A., each carrying fifty pounds of bomb circulars, were assigned to take part in the flight. The circulars bear the inscription: "This was dropped by a United States aviator. It might have been a German bomb. To avoid bombs buy bonds."

Liberty Loan \$10 participation certificates issued by the Federal Reserve Bank, now on sale by many banks and stores throughout the New York district, are reported to be supplying a steadily growing demand.

The 300,000 schoolchildren in New York were informed in the classroom to-day of the necessity for the loan and the importance for every American man, woman and child to fix his name to the roll of honor. If the plan to establish the Liberty Loan Club of the public schools of Greater New York is carried out.

The Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe Railroad has subscribed \$5,000,000, exclusive of purchases of employees under a gradual payment plan.

Italians Support Plan to Establish Jewish State

Washington, June 7. — Cordial approval of the idea of an independent Jewish state in Palestine is expressed by diplomats representing the entente powers here. This assurance has been obtained from the statesmen of the allied nations by the leaders of the Zionist movement. The latest country to respond to the inquiries of the Zionists is Italy. Members of the Italian mission asserted yesterday that Italy approved of the project.

The allied Governments do not contest the right of the Jews. It was declared by an entente diplomat yesterday, to establish themselves wherever they desire. If many or few Jews should return to Palestine to assist in the establishment of their national independence and formation of a government they would receive the recognition and encouragement of the allied nations. It was said.

The views are held by the entente Governments that the Jewish question is limited to Russia and Yalta, and in Russia the Jews have been granted equal rights by the Provisional Government. It is considered improbable that Russia will return to pogroms and the persecution of the Jews.
