Miss Matilda Schmidt, of 28 North Thirteenth street is attending the reunion of her class of the St. Anne's Seminary, Wilkes-Barre.

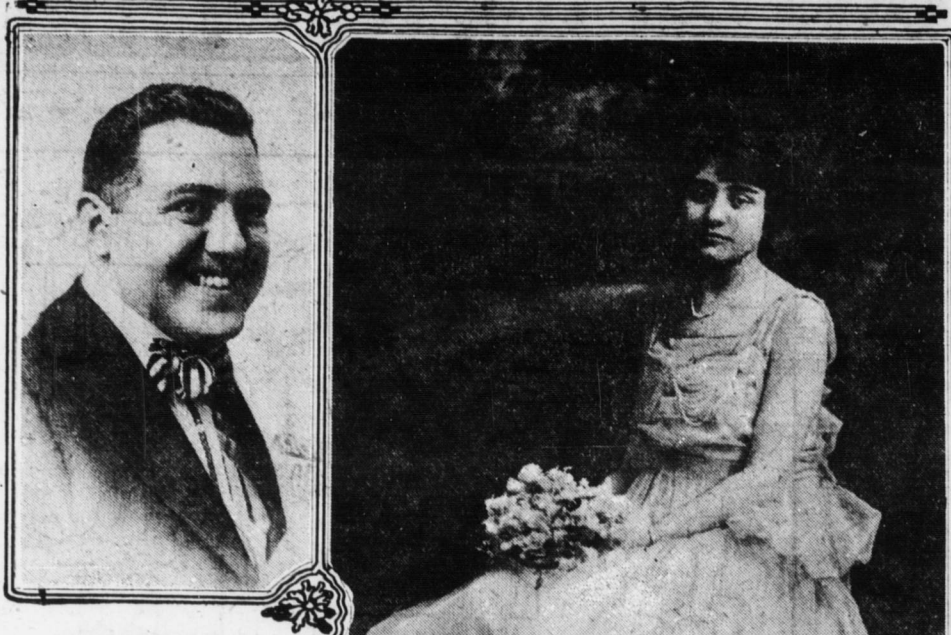
