Washington, D. C., June 15.—A prohibitory tax on foodstuffs used in making beverages was formally written into the war tax bill to-day by the Senate finance committee. The new rate is \$60 per hundred pounds.

Other liquor tax increases were approved by the committee to-day virtually without change from the house schedules. The manufacturers' tax of 5 per cent. on athletic goods, cameras, patent medicines, perfumeries and cosmetics was reduced to 2 per cent. and a substitute tax on scalpers' sales of tickets was adopted, making the rate from 5 to 50 per cent. instead of 50 per cent. flat.

London, June 15. — More than 100,000 prisoners have been taken by the British during the war, James Ian MacPherson, parliamentary secretary to the war office, announced in the House of Commons to-day.

On the western front the British armies have captured 434 guns since July 1, 1916. In Mesopotamia 132 guns have been taken since the beginning of the war, exclusive of those lost at Kut-el-Amara and subsequently recaptured. In Egypt 18 guns have been taken.

The territory regained by the British on the western front since July 1, 1916, amounts to 600 square miles.
