Petrograd, June 20.—The American
Railways Commission, which is now in Petrograd, proposes to make a wider examination of Russia's railroad resources than was first contemplated and a trip through the south is now being considered. The com-mission is confident that great im-provements are practicable, even with the existing deficiency in rolling stock. The immediate problem is con-gestion and the commission believes that even under present conditions traffic can be increased more than threefold.

Nekrasoff, minister of communications, who is accompanying the commission. In a statement given to The Associated Press by M. Mitinsky, director of the Department of Material, warm appreciation was expressed for the work already done by the Americans. M. Mitinsky, who met the commission on its arrival at Vladivostok, said:

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U.S. TO FIX COST TRAFFIC RULES OF MUNITIONS FOR ARMY AND NAVY

> Sec. Daniels Calls Federal Trade Commission to **Study Costs**

Washington, June 20. - Secretary called the entire membership of the Federal Trade Commis sion into conference to-day and re-

sion into conference to-day and requested them to ascertain without delay the cost of production of all basic raw materials entering into the manufacture of munitions or powder for the navy.

Copper, steel, coal, iron and fuel oil are included and Mr. Daniels said that when the production cost for such articles were established the price to be paid by the navy would be fixed, allowing "for a fair, even liberal profit" to the producers.

"Beyond that," the secretary added, "I am not going to pay."

Fending the fixing of cost prices by the Trade Commission the department will continue to direct producers and manufacturers to deliver to the navy such articles and supplies as it needs.
