Police reserves were turned out and soon some twenty policemen were patrolling the White House, keeping everyone moving. A police captain addressed the crowd, advis-ing the militants to go and enlist. The inscription on the banner to-day was the same as that on the one displayed yesterday, accusing President Wilson and Elinu Root of "deceiving Russia," in saying the United States is a democracy and pleading with the Russian mission to demand the entranchisement of women in the United States. The banner was in front of the White House gates only for a few minutes and the crowd that collect-ed was not large.
