DONEGAL CHURCH ANNUAL REUNION

Hundreds of People From All Parts of United States Visit Historic Place

The evening session was presided over by Prof. John S. Simons, of Marietta. The Rev. David R. Workman, of Paradise; the Rev. Andrew Taylor, D. D., of York, and others spoke.

HALIFAX GIRL BECOMES BRIDE

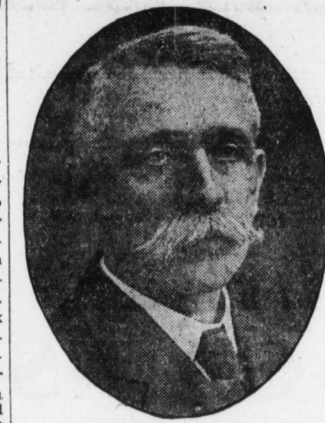
Pretty Wedding Ceremony Unites Miss Anna R. Fetterhoff and C. E. Sweigard
