CAMP MEMORIAL PASSING ALONG

On Second Reading in Lower Branch of the Legislature For This Evening

The Camp Curtin memorial bill, which passed the Senate last week, is on the special appropriation bill second reading calendar in the House for to-night along with a number of other appropriations. Practically all of the other local bills have reached the Governor except the Capitol Park highway and sidewalk measure which will probably be passed in a day or so because it is one of the most important of the bills relating to the improvement.

HARRISBURG BOYS IN CAMP AT NIAGARA WILL BE VISITED BY HOME FOLKS, ON JULY 4

Fort Niagara, N. Y., June 23.—Plans are being perfected to make Independence Day the greatest day in the history of the training camp here. Hundreds of Pennsylvanians are expected to spend the day in camp with their relatives and friends who are here training for commissions in the first conscript army America is to raise.

Just who the speakers will be has not been decided, but efforts are being made to make the day most notable by bringing together the chief executives of the Keystone State, whose sons are here training, and the Governor of New York in whose State the camp is located.

When Governor Brumbaugh was here Memorial Day he declared it his intention to invite Governor Charles S. Whitman to Niagara Camp, and he didn't know of a better time than the Fourth of July, but added that it all depended upon what their duties in connection with the draft might be in the meantime. Efforts are now being made to bring about this meeting.

Big Athletic Program But whether they come or not the Independence Day program will be a most elaborate one. It is certain that some speaker from Pennsylvania with a national reputation will be here. And those in camp are arranging a most inviting athletic program. The personnel of the camp includes some of the best known athletes in the east. Most of them are the holders of amateur records and they will compete against each other in some dozen different events on Independence Day.

The athletics will be in charge of George W. Braden, the post athletic director who before coming here was director of training for the Philadelphia Central Y. M. C. A. Mr. Braden has arranged a program which includes baseball, basketball and a number of track and field events, as well as a tennis match. Three men from each company may enter each event, and any one of these may be entered in any number of events. This matter will be in charge of the athletic directors of the different companies, who will submit the entries to Mr. Braden.

The track events will include the fifty and hundred-yard dashes, the 220, 440 and 880-yard runs, and a mile relay race with four men from each company comprising the teams. The field events will include the discus throw, standing broad jump, running broad jump, running high jump, pole vault and shot put.

Crack Tennis Matches There will also be a tug-of-war between teams selected from the three battalions. The tennis match will be between Biddle, the crack court man of Philadelphia, and Robert Murray, the undefeated amateur champion of America, a resident of Niagara.

GIVES SERMON ON FOOD SHORTAGE

Dr. Smucker Makes Plea For Conservation; Must Eliminate All Waste

The Rev. Dr. Clayton Albert Smucker, minister of Stevens Memorial Methodist Episcopal Church, Thirteenth and Vernon streets, preached on "Food Shortage and War Bullets" last night. He said in part:

"America has awakened to the danger of a world-wide food shortage. France and England have 10,000,000 men in arms. We must feed this army. The food requirements in America have multiplied beyond belief, by good wages and universal employment. The German submarine has sent a million tons of breadstuffs, beef and pork to the bottom of the sea to feed the fishes. Must Save Food

"Now, the immediate and outstanding problem is the conservation of food supplies. People must economize; must use less; must eliminate waste, not because you and your home folk face hunger but because it is distinctly your patriotic duty in the present crisis. The American housewife permits a loss each year of food valued at \$700,000,000, most of which goes into the garbage can. This is criminal. Everybody at this time ought to help to eliminate waste. Begin to-day to 'do your bit.' They serve who save for those who fight.

The money-from-the-war mania has seized all classes and the curse of it, too, is seizing all. No blacker battlefield. We have come to realize our dependence upon the farmer.

Lindner Golf Links Opened For Benefit of Red Cross

Carlisle, Pa., June 25.—The big golf links on the country estate of John Lindner, Forest Hills, will be thrown open to the public in aid of the Red Cross. Mr. Lindner, who is head of the Lindner Shoe Company, announced today. A fee will be charged and all receipts will be turned over to the humanitarian society. Much of the lawn and woods parts of the estate, which were laid out and cultivated at much expense, have been placed in food, which will be distributed among families and given to various organizations to aid those in straightened circumstances because of the war. The Lindner Company also want to New York and Belgium a number of cases of ladies' and children's shoes, which are much needed in that country.

Wedding Out Complete

The wedding out is about complete and there will be very few additional dismissals except for laundry and means violation of camp discipline. About 150 men have gone home. The few others who are to go will probably leave within the next few days, as soon as the surgeons complete their examinations. Each day every man in camp has a turn on the butts, two hours a day being assigned to each company on the ranges. No effort is being made by the instructors to make crack shots out of any man, although some exceptionally good scores are being made by individual members. The purpose of this training is to teach these men to become officers, how to teach the men who will be under them. Later in the training they will be instructed in pistol shooting for officers and taught how to use the weapon effectively. Next week they will also get their first drill over an obstacle course 200 yards long. There will be seven obstacles to cross, including a ditch five feet wide and three feet deep, a low fence, a high fence, a zigzag obstruction and a parapet wall.
