FOURTH OF JULY AT WICONISCO

Parade and Patriotic Exercises Planned For Afternoon and Evening

Two Exemption Boards For Cumberland Co. Districts

Carlisle, Pa., June 28.—Division of the districts to be under the supervision of the two county exemption boards was announced today. The first to be in charge of Commissioner A. E. Selber, Jacob Meitz, Silver Spring, and Dr. Harvey B. Paschore, West Fairview, will embrace twenty-seven townships, all in the eastern part of the county up to the eastern limits of Carlisle. The population of this district is 30,592. The other district will be from Carlisle west and the board is composed of Commissioner D. G. Bishop, Sheriff Alfred Greenwood and Dr. J. Bruce McCreary, Shippensburg. The population is 32,286.
