Carlisle, Pa., June 8.-At a meeting of the secretaries of the various school districts of Cumberland county inder the auspices of the Public Safety Committee in the Carlisle Chamber of Commerce rooms last evening, it was proposed that Cumberland county should enroll in the Hoover Food Army 15,000 women in Hoover Food Army 15,000 women in the fight scainst waste and inefficien-cy in household management.
