Supervisors Asked to Put Roads Into Shape First Deputy State Highway Commissioner Joseph W. Hunter, to-day notified township supervisors of the second class to file their annual reports with the State Highway Department before August 1, 1917.

This action is taken in preparation for the distribution to the second-class townships of the cash tax bonus for the maintenance of dirt roads. All of these reports should have been filed on January 1, but many of the townships are delinquent, and unless they comply with this notice, they cannot share in the appropriation of \$1,783,470, made by the Legislature for the payment of the amounts due the townships, if favorable action is taken by Governor Brumbaugh on this appropriation. The State Highway Department will begin immediate distribution of the funds to those townships who have complied with all requirements.
