Allotment For Second Officers Training Period

Uncle Sam is making his last appeal for recruits for the second officers training camps, which will open the last week of August and continue until November. Sixteen camps will be opened in various sections of the country to train the men who will officer the second draft of 500,000 men.

Any citizen, having a good mental education, not necessarily a college graduate, is eligible. The candidate must be between the ages of twenty years and nine months and forty-four years. Each man, if accepted, will be paid \$100 a month for a period of three months, for which time he enlists, and agrees to accept any service offered to him by the Government at the conclusion of the training.


