Evening Chat Secretary Joseph Kalbfus, of the State Game Commission, says that there are a good many people in the State who had better familiarize themselves with the game code, especially that clause which relates to dogs killing game. The game code says Dr. Kalbfus, is in a majority of cases the old law reduced to a comprehensive act with a limited number of new features. There are different seasons and the act is aimed more to afford sport than to give pot hunters a chance to shoot up in the game in a district. There are some provisions which it is believed will put a stop to the ravaging of sections by men who go simply to make as large bags as possible. The feature of the code which Dr. Kalbfus thinks that people should study and carefully observe is that relating to dogs. The dog has been declared as much of an enemy to the sheep as to the game of the state and it is expected that the dog license law, which is also a code relative to dogs, will provide means of protecting which have the provisions of the game code which allow a person who allows a dog, either wild or through carelessness to run down game, to be liable to a fine which can be increased according to the game killed. The trouble seems to be according to the State officials money to distribute quail or other game that through their neglect there has been much loss.
