

Three Negroes Receive Reprieve Few Minutes Before Execution Time

Wilmington, Del., July 27.—With all preparations for their execution completed, Adam Harey, Webster Fumell and William Prestman, Sussex county negroes who were convicted of the murder of Harry Parker, another negro, at Lewes, last September, were saved for sixty days at least by a reprieve for that period granted by Governor Townsend this morning. The reprieve arrived only a short time before 10 o'clock, the hour set for the execution.

U. S. Soldiers to Shoot Across Mexican Line to Kill if Fired On

El Paso, July 27.—Brigadier General George Bell, Jr., district commander U. S. A., here, has informed Mexican Consul Bravo that United States soldiers on patrol duty would return the fire whenever they were fired upon across the border. The soldiers, General Bell added, had been ordered to shoot to kill.

General Bell's statement was in reply to a protest, lodged by the Mexican consul, alleging that a Mexican soldier on the night of July 17 was mortally wounded. General Bell informed the consul that he had found that the Mexican soldiers fired first.

STATE POLICE SENT TO SCENE OF CHESTER RIOTS

By nightfall 30 members of the State Police, including two officers will be on duty at Chester and Marcus Hook where race riots have occurred the past few days. In addition to the State Police, 14 men already on the ground Captain Wilhelm and 6 men from Pottsville, 3 men from Lancaster, 2 from Amber and 2 from Langhorne were ordered to report to Chester immediately.

back the advancing hostile infantry. In executing the district southeast of the city, the Russian forces were only a short distance, new positions were taken up.

British Guns Active. Help in the disorganizing section of the Russian front continues to come from the Rumanians. They have pushed well up the Sutchiza Valley.

Along the British front in Belgium, the German forces are growing more severe, the artillery continues its extremely violent activity, the intensity of the fighting is increasing.

The chief incident of the infantry fighting occurred southwest of Warneton, Belgium, where the Germans were driven from LaBasseville last night, the British withdrawing from the village this morning.

Despite all the unfavorable news that still continues to come from the Russian theater, there are occasional signs of an improvement in the situation. Last night's Petrograd dispatches, for instance, caused to report a somewhat better situation at the front, probably as the result of the drastic measures to restore discipline among the soldiers.

Similar stringent measures have proved effective in dealing with the disorderly elements. Reports of a renewed fighting in the capital are accompanied by the news that government troops stepped into the situation with salutary effect, suppressing the rioting completely.

General Korniloff's orders to shoot traitors and marauders are being carried out. The commandant of the grenadier division has been removed for refusing to fire on deserters.

The Fifth cyclist battalion fought most bravely. It kept off three German motor cars and its machine guns and carbines and made several bayonet charges afoot. In one attack the men rode their bicycles.

MUCH GOLD ON HAND
