

SIX-CENT FARES ARE PROTESTED

Public Service Commission Takes Up Increases Recently Placed on File



The Public Service Commission is wrestling with several complaints against proposals to establish the 6-cent fare and has been getting notice of other companies which plan to put it into operation.

Protests filed against four systems because of the 6-cent fare have been scheduled for hearings or are in process of action before the commission and Friday hearings will be held at Wilkes-Barre by Chairman W. D. B. Alley in three such complaints regarding increases in fares in the Hazleton district.

Filter Plant Described in Commissioners' Report

The seventh annual report of the borough water commissioners was issued this morning from the press of the Horwath printery. It is printed in pamphlet form, containing thirty-three pages of reading and statistical matter and ten fine illustrations of the interior and exterior of the pumping station and the filter plant. The workings of the filter plant is extensively described by M. B. Litch, borough chemist, in charge of the filtration plant. Statistics given show the cost of operation of the entire water department since 1900, comparisons being made from year to year.

The present board of commissioners is composed of the following members: George F. Polzer, president; Charles P. Feidt, secretary; Oliver P. Baskins, superintendent; and Keister and Walter E. Calkins. The report is printed on a fine quality paper and the preface presents a high grade of printer's art.

WILL TRANSFER \$12,000 FUND

Money Never Used For Isolation Hospital to Be Used

The borough council at its meeting this evening is expected to pave the way for the transfer of a fund of \$12,000, appropriated by the voters, six or eight years ago for the erection of a municipal isolation hospital to other purposes. The action to be taken to-night will consist of the presentation of an ordinance providing that the transfer be voted on at the coming fall election. This provision is expected to pass first reading this evening.

After the ordinance has passed the third reading, if it is approved by the voters, the money will be devoted to the purchase of additional motor fire apparatus. A bill to place the transfer before the voters was passed by the state Legislature recently and was introduced by Representative D. J. Bechtold, of the borough.

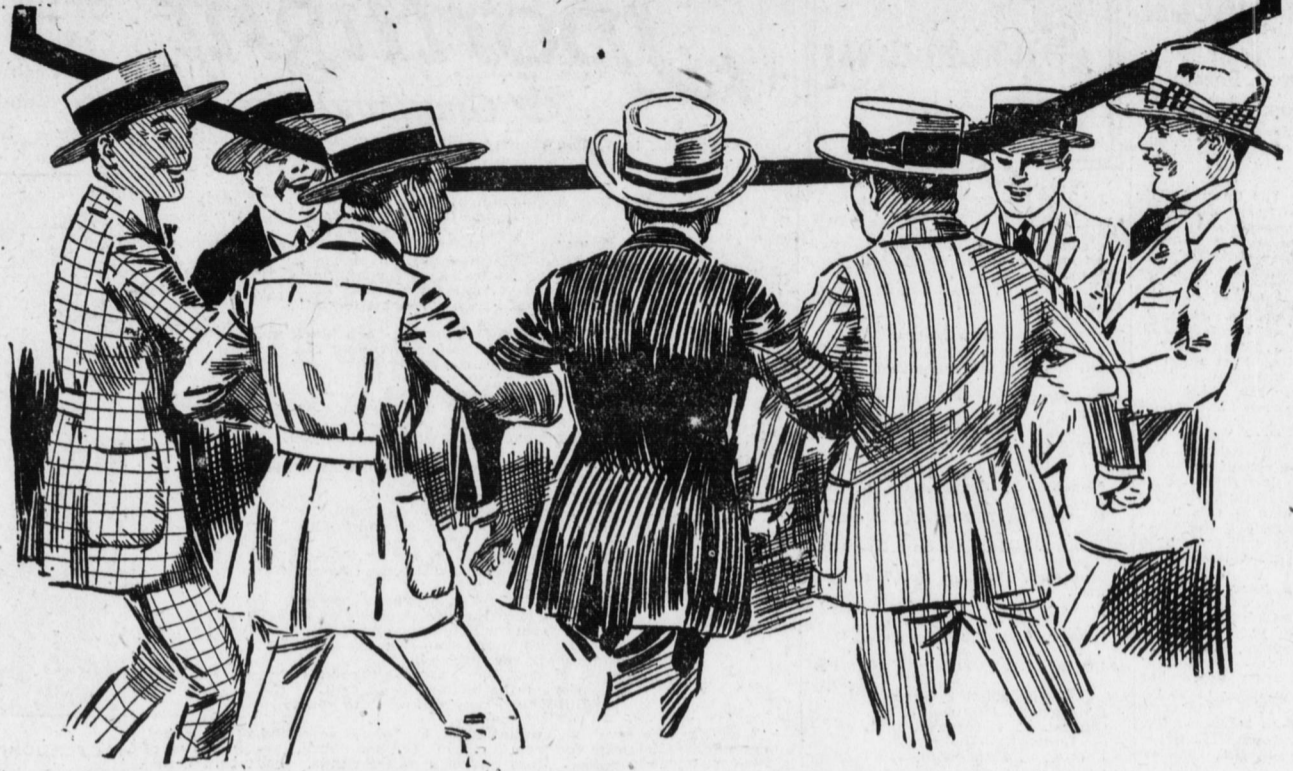
