

COMPENSATION PRECEDENTS SET

Commissioner Scott Gives a Number of Important Decisions in Cases



In a series of opinions by Commissioner John A. Scott, the State Compensation Board today sustained a number of appeals in cases where referees had found against railroads engaged in interstate commerce. These cases are some of those which had been placed on the postponed calendar until after the United States Supreme Court rendered its decisions in compensation cases involving the principles of interstate commerce.

Referees who awarded compensation in such cases are reversed and appeals announced as sustained as the referees are without jurisdiction under the Supreme Court decision.

The cases include Ross N. Hogen-tolger, Harrisburg, and Harry Lester Booth, Harrisburg; William J. Pastorius, Harrisburg, and Theresa Knab, Philadelphia, and Charles A. Myers, Gordon, against the Philadelphia and Reading Railway Company.

A modified award is made in the case of McManus estate, Pittsburgh, vs. Winter Garden Company.

Private Lane Case.—The Public Service Commission has listed for argument next Monday the cases in which the jurisdiction of the commission over private lanes in grade crossing abolition has been raised. These cases arose in Bensalem township, Bucks county, where the Pennsylvania Railroad seeks to abolish grade crossings. A number of Philadelphia industrial siding and grade crossing cases are listed for later in the week.

Complaint On Jitney.—Complaint

was filed to-day by the Delaware Valley Railway Company, which operates in Monroe county, against jitney-men who have been running in the vicinity of Stroudsburg without certificates of public convenience.

No Information Here.—Officials at the office of the Governor and the Public Service Commission to-day declared that they had no knowledge of any resignation of William A. Magee, of Pittsburgh, as a Public Service Commissioner. Mr. Magee is considered as a very probable candidate for mayor of Pittsburgh and there have been persistent reports that he has resigned. Mr. Magee is not here.

No Notice of Appointment.—People at the Department of Labor and Industry to-day reiterated their statement of yesterday that no notice has been given of the appointment of William B. Smith, son of Ward Leader Peter E. Smith, of Philadelphia, as chief of the bureau of statistics.

The closing feature was the march around the inclosure of the auditorium in single file singing "We're Marching to Zion" and "We'll Never Say Good-By In Heaven."

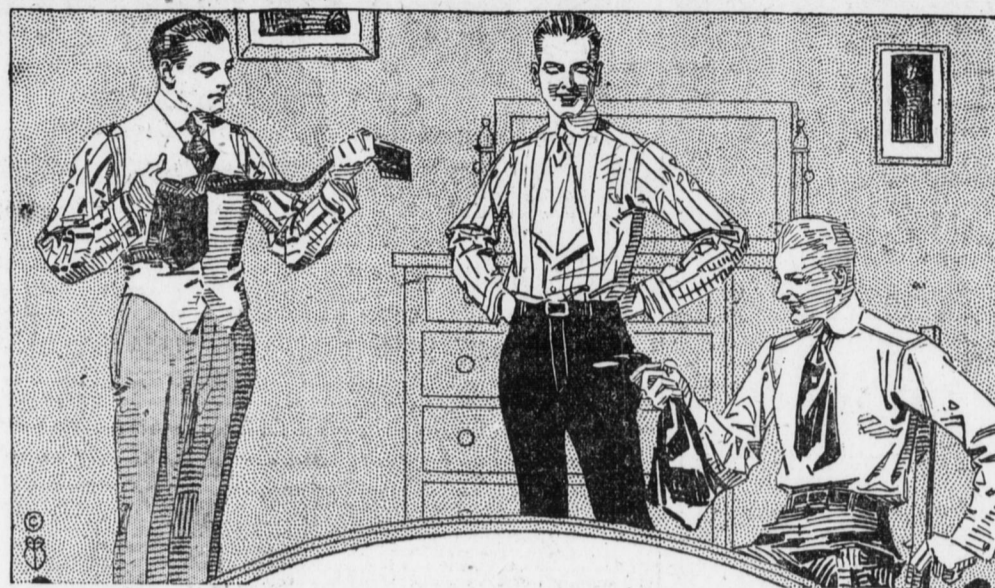
