

CONFUSION IS SEEN IN PRICE MOVEMENT

Small Fractions Gained by Leaders More Than Offset by Heaviness of Equipments

 New York, Aug. 17. — Wall Street. — The confusion existing in speculative quarters by reason of prevailing conditions was again reflected in the irregular movement of prices at the opening of today's market.
 United States Steel, Marine, Pfd. and some of the minor specialties gained small fractions, but these were soon met in the heaviness of Industrial Alcohol, Bethlehem Steel and Crucible Steel, Central Leather and other equipments. Ralls pursued their recent narrow and irregular course and metals were apathetic.
 Price movements became more erratic during the forenoon, some stocks adding to first gains, while other extended their initial losses. Alcohol was under especial pressure, declining 7 1/2 points, subsequently rallying 2 1/2. Delaware and Hudson dropped four to the new low record of 195 1/2, and other standard rails, including coilers, were reactionary. Among the more active industrials and equipments the usual week-end closing of short commitments was indicated. Liberty Bonds sold at 99.80 to 99.86.

OPPOSITION TO INSURANCE FOR FIGHTERS SHOWN
 Congressmen Claim it Would Upset Pensions; System Denounced
 Washington, Aug. 17. — Congressional opposition to the government's plan for insuring the lives of soldiers and sailors because it would upset the pension system, showed its head today at a hearing before the House Commerce Committee where the administration insurance bill was discussed.
 Chairman Adamson predicting opposition to it, said he had been warned by a pension system advocate that the new plan would upset pensions for a hundred years. Representative Montague, of Virginia, another member of the committee also predicted opposition.
 Secretary McAdoo, Samuel Gom-

pers, president of the American Federation of Labor and Judge Julian Mack, of Chicago, who drafted the insurance bill denounced the pension system and declared that one of the primary purposes of the insurance measure was to forever wipe it out of existence.
 "Men in the army and the navy are employees of the United States and should be compensated as such," Mr. Gompers declared. "They should not obtain their pensions at the pleasure of Congress."
 Several life insurance men appeared to oppose the optional insurance feature of the bill. They are not opposed to the compensation feature by which the government would make payments without cost to the insured for death or injury in the service.


