

RED CROSS GETS SUPPLY ORDERS

Harrisburg Branch Given Big Allotment of Materials to Be Used in France

The Harrisburg Branch of the Red Cross society has been notified that it has been given an allotment of 6,500 each of sweaters, mufflers, pairs of wristlets and pairs of socks to be furnished as soon as possible as part of the big amount of supplies to be sent to France at once.

A cable appeal for immediate shipment of an enormous amount of supplies reached the American Red Cross from Major Grayson M. P. Murphy to-day. The cable follows: "Begin shipping at once one and a half million each knitted mufflers, sweaters, socks and wristlets. These are desperately needed before cold weather. In view of the shortage of fuel and other comforts they will be of incredible value in both military and civilian work."

"Last winter broke the record for cold and misery among the people here. They inexpressibly dread lest the coming winter find us without supplies to meet the situation. I urge you on behalf of our soldiers and those of our allies who will suffer in the frozen trenches. Thousands of Belgian and French refugees and

repatriates are being returned through Switzerland to France." Divisional Directors Named

Howard Heinz Federal Food Agent in Penna.

Washington, Aug. 17. — Howard Heinz, of Pittsburgh, has been named as Federal Food Commissioner for Pennsylvania. His appointment, with those of commissioners for twenty-seven other States, was approved by President Wilson.

The State commissioner will administer the food control bill in so far as it applies to State matters and will co-ordinate State food activities with those of the Federal administration. All the men will serve without pay. Mr. Heinz is head of the food conservation activities of the Pennsylvania committee of public safety.

HOME-READING COURSE FOR CITIZEN-SOLDIERS

(Issued by the War Department and all rights to reprint reserved) This course of thirty daily lessons is offered to the men selected for service in the National Army as a practical help in getting started in the right way. It is informal in tone and does not attempt to give binding rules and directions. These are contained in the various manuals and regulations of the United States Army, to which this Course is merely introductory.

LESSON NO. 5 First Days in Camp (Preceding Lessons: 1. Your Post of Honor; 2. Making Good in the Army; 3. Nine Soldierly Qualities; 4. Getting Ready for Camp.)

There will be nearly forty thousand men in each cantonment. The task of preparing for your arrival is enormous. Each cantonment will require 25,000,000 feet of lumber, 7,500 doors, 87,000 window sashes, 4,665 yards of Portland cement, and 5,000 cars of broken stone. The water supply of a cantonment will be 2,500,000 gallons a day. It will have its own sewerage system, fire department, bakeries, ice plants, and hospitals. It will even require a gigantic steam-heating plant for the entire cantonment with a population of 40,000, well cared for—that is the task.

In spite of the best efforts, it is possible that some of the details may remain unfinished at the beginning of your camp life. There will be a certain amount of bustle and apparent confusion on the surface. Bear in mind that underneath it all lies a well-thought-out plan. In working out this plan everything possible has been done for the comfort and convenience of individual soldiers. Don't grumble if you run into some temporary delays or inconveniences at the beginning. One of the tests of a good soldier is his cheerful willingness to take things as they are and make the best of them.

You are naturally interested in forming some idea of the camp life of a soldier. The description which follows will help you in forming this idea. However, there will be many changes as you go along in your training. As the men of the National Army must get ready in record-breaking time, their training will be more strenuous than that of soldiers in peace. You will find there is plenty of work ahead of you. The average energetic young American will be glad of it.

The soldier arises for the day usually at about 5 o'clock, a little earlier in the summer and a little later in the winter. The buglers sound the call known as reveille. The men dress and fall in. Your first experience of military drill will probably consist of "setting-up exercises," which ordinarily occupy the first few minutes of the day. They consist of certain movements of the head, arms, trunk and legs which are carefully designed not merely to develop your muscles but also to increase your skill, grace, self-control and self-reliance. Red Cross to Spend Big Sum to Fight Malaria

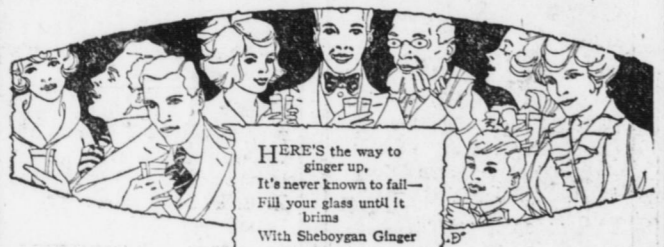
The War Council of the American Red Cross has appropriated \$10,000 to free the Columbia, S. C., cantonment and its immediate vicinity from malaria. The plan of the campaign includes draining of the stagnant water, regrading the creeks to keep the water in motion through an unobstructed channel, the first step being the removal of the debris and weeds, and conducting an educational campaign among the neighbors of the cantonment. This is supplemented by a systematic effort to cure malarial diseases throughout the civil population and to insure the proper screening of all houses. The danger from malaria is great, not only in proportion to the number of mosquito carriers but also in proportion to the number of malarial cases from which these carriers borrow the contagion.

Soldier Who Helped Catch Czolgosz, Dead

Pittsburgh, Aug. 17. — Louis Neff, aged 46, a member of the Coast Artillery and one of the men who overpowered Czolgosz when the latter shot President William McKinley at the Pan-American Exposition in Buffalo, September 6, 1901, is dead. Neff died suddenly while en route to a local hospital, to undergo an operation for the purpose of removing an abscess from his lungs. Neff left the army five years ago, and since that time had resided in Sharsburg.
