TRIBUTE TO GEN. CLEMENT

Big Parade in Sunbury When Division Commander Starts for Camp Hancock, Ga.

Sunbury, Pa., Aug. 20.—Sunbury paid a splendid brave farewell to Major General Charles M. Clement, commander of the Pennsylvania Division National Guard of the United States, before he left for Camp Hancock, Ga., early today.

Headed by the First Cavalry band, a parade was held in which civic and military bodies took part. Included in it was the headquarters staff, Troop 1, First Pennsylvania Cavalry, Captain Walter C. Vrooman, and Company F, Fourth Pennsylvania Infantry, Captain Clyde M. Smith; the Rotary Club of Sunbury, the Northumberland County Bar Association and numerous citizens.

At the station before entraining, General Clement made a short speech in which he thanked the people for their interest in his leaving, and was given round after round of enthusiastic applause. It was a fine demonstration of the esteem in which the general is held, and a deserving tribute to his high military authority in the State.

General Clement was accompanied by his secretary, William S. McDonald, of Sunbury, and Philadelphia, who will be joined by his aide and go direct to Camp Hancock, with the exception of a short stay at Washington where he has official business at the War Department.

Before leaving, General Clement said it would be four or five days before the State troops start south, and then at the rate of a regiment a day it will take two weeks to get the entire division started south.

Until an assignment is made, headquarters here will be in charge of Lieutenant David J. Davis, division adjutant.
