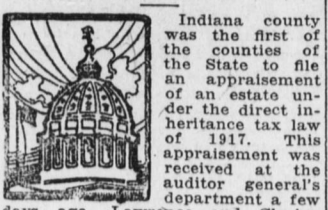

Annual Convention of State Association Under Way; Big Parade To-Morrow

Harrisburg Elks left to-day for Shamokin where they will attend the annual convention of the State Association. In to-day's crowd of fourteen were Past Exalted Ruler Jonas M. Rudy, Exalted Ruler James L. Carroll, and Secretary C. R. Weber.

To-night the Shamokin lodge and visiting brethren will march from the Elks' Home to Market and Independence streets, where Hon. Frederick Moser, general chairman, will touch the button and a special electrical illumination for Independence street will blaze forth for the nights of the convention.

To-morrow Judge Moser will deliver the opening speech of the convention. State President Oliver K. Cowell, Sunbury, will respond to an address of welcome by Hon. John P. Drumheller, Chief Burgess.

In the afternoon a business session will be held in the Knights of Columbus Hall, and in the evening there will be an automobile parade, with George J. Higgins as chief marshal, after which there will be a display of fireworks at Edgewood Park.
