

CELEBRATION OF ROMPER DAY TO EXCEED OTHERS

Band Concerts, Folk Dancing, Exhibits and Sports Few of the Features

Plans for one of the biggest romper day celebrations in the history of the city playground department were completed today by Playground Supervisor Earl C. Ford with his corps of instructors.
