POUND OF BREAD FOR SIX CENTS IS U.S. PROPOSAL

Hoover Plans For Standard Loaf of All-Wheat Flour For Consumers

Washington, Aug. 29.—A standard sixteen-ounce loaf of bread, to retail for six cents, is planned by the Food Administration.

The bread will be known as the "Liberty Loaf" or by some similar name. It will be sold for cash over the counters, or by bakers who deliver by wagon routes to families.

Experiments with the pound loaf are now being conducted in two big Washington bakeries, which have placed their facilities at the disposal of the Food Administration.

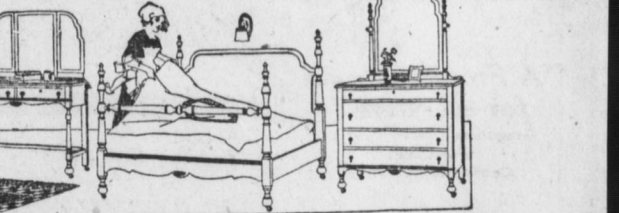
