New Fog Signals Worked Out by British Scientist

A new system for vessels signaling in the fog has been worked entity a British scientist. It is belie ed that this will prevent many collisions when put into general use. The scientist points out that the sound of a forghorn comes out of the mist in such a freakish way that it is impossible for the pilot on another vessel to estimate accurately how far away is the vessel blowing the horn. In the new system, a foghorn signal and a wireless signal will be sent out simultaneously. The speed of wireless waves and sound waves is different, and the exact difference in speed is known. By noting the interval that elapses between the receiving of the wireless message and the sound of the foghorn, the receiving vessel can tell exactly how far away the sending vessel is. "Maintain a clear vision, stand true and loyal, so that before another Labor Day shall come a desirable, permanent peace shall have been established, founded upon the highest concepts, justice, freedom and humanity.

"Never in the history of the world was it so essential that the peoples of all countries imbued with the spirit of freedom, justice and democracy stand firmly united until these principles are firmly established among all peoples of all countries. 
