

It is especially important that you should obey at once any directions that may be given to you as to resetting the sights on your rifle and that the rapidity of your firing should be controlled by the orders of your captain.

skirmish lines you must rely in part on your own initiative and judgment.

The next step in extended-order drill is to practice kneeling, lying down, and advancing at a run. In the meantime, you will be getting practice also in rifle loading, and a little later will begin to carry your rifle when advancing as a skirm isher and to practice loading, alming and firing from the skirmish line.

Use of Cover

One of the most important features of this part of your training will consist of learning to conceal yourself from the view of the enemy by taking advantage of hillocks, ditches, doorways, windows, or any other cover that may be at hand Your object is to reach the enemy. The more skillful you are in the use of cover the smaller the chances of your being disabled during the attack.

But you are not to remain too long in one place, no matter how well you may be concealed. Your vauue as a soldier depends on your ability to advance from cover to cover.
