LABOR PLEDGES LOYALTY TO U. S.

Germany just now was declared to be traitorous to the United States by Samuel Gompers, temporary chairman of the convention, aroused enthusiasm when he declared that no political party cult or propaganda would be permitted to use the organization.

Loyal to Nation The complete declaration of principles as announced by Mr. Gompers as follows: "Believers in the great and splendid vision of democracy and internationalism, the fraternalism and solidarity of all peoples, we assert at this time our unequalled loyalty to the Republic of the United States of America and our determination to do all that lies in our power to win the war in which it is engaged."

Great Wastage of Food Complained of in England London, England.—In a report to the Stepten public health committee, Dr. D. L. Many thousands of tons of fish, bacon and potatoes had, he stated, to be destroyed because of improper storage either during shipment or on their arrival at the docks.

WAR CONDITIONS GET ATTENTION Public Service Commission Refers to the Unusual Transportation Situation

Note of the strain put upon railroads by the war has been taken into consideration by the Public Service Commission in an opinion handed down by Commissioner John S. Rilling yesterday.

In regard to the war conditions the opinion says: "The commission cannot be unmindful of the present abnormal conditions and the extent to which they affect railroad companies. The several agencies cooperating with the federal government in the conduct of the war have been called the attention of Public Service Commissions to the great demand now being made upon railroad companies and that they have agreed to curtail their passenger service to better meet the demands of the nation."

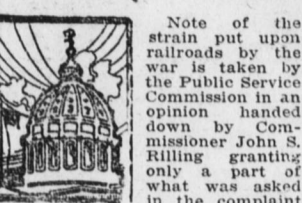

Need Not Insure—First Deputy Attorney General Keller to-day gave an opinion to the State Live Stock Sanitary Board, which is secretary of the board of directors of the Western Penitentiary, that convicts who are performing labor in and about the penitentiary should not receive compensation from the State, are not employees within the meaning of the compensation law and need not be insured for compensation.

To Sell Houses—The toll houses along the old Lancaster pike from the Philadelphia city line to Paoli at which thousands and thousands of persons have paid thousands and thousands of dollars will be sold by the State Highway Department on October 2 and the last vestige of the toll will then pass out of State control. The plan is to have a progressive sale, starting at the house near the Philadelphia city line at 1 o'clock and stopping at each house in turn until the toll is completely eliminated.

Inspection Open—Philadelphia is to undertake a special inspection of hotels and public eating places with a view of tightening up the enforcement of the law relating to sanitary conditions of the eating places and the help employed therein. An arrangement has been made between Dr. Wimmer, chief director of the Department of Public Health and Charities of Philadelphia, and Dr. Samuel G. Dixon, State Health Commissioner, according to the plan which Dr. Krusen has made known to the state health authorities and he expects to put a force of inspectors into the field this week.

Montreal, Sept. 6.—Joseph Trumbay, one of the men arrested in connection with the dynamiting of Lord Athol's residence at Carlisleville, has confessed to the authorities, it was announced today, that he placed the bomb near Lord Athol's residence, having been forced to do so, it is said, by Handfield, who committed suicide to avoid arrest, and Monte, who is still at large.
