FALSE FIRE ALARMS ARE EXPENSIVE TO COMPANY

A fire alarm in Steelton costs the Bethlehem steel plant several hundred dollars. Fifteen false alarms in the past ten weeks have run into large figures and drastic measures will be taken to break up this practice.

Between fifty and 100 steel employees who are fire company members are given permission to answer an alarm with their company trucks.
