600 Chinese Killed in Great Wind Storm

Amoy, China, Sept. 19.—More than 600 natives were killed by the typhoon which struck Amoy without warning at the end of last week. Eighty-five per cent. of the water craft in the harbor nearby was destroyed. No foreigners have been reported lost. Outlying districts cannot be communicated with and it is feared great damage has been done there. One village of about sixteen out of 200 houses was completely destroyed. The Japanese steamship Amakusa-Maru of 2,356 tons gross, is on the coast opposite Kulangang and it is doubtful if she can be salvaged.

Russia's Ex-War Chief Defends Self at Trial

Petrograd, Sept. 19.—Witnesses in the trial of General Seukhomlinoff, who is facing charges of high treason, having concluded their evidence, the general today made a statement of any explanation he might wish to make. The former minister appeared exhausted by the intense and long proceedings. Speaking in a weak, tired voice, he endeavored to prove the necessity of the measures which he had given orders. He declared that owing to the helplessness of the army, the fortresses long had lost all their strategic importance and would only have been traps for the retreating troops.
