Amoy, China, Sept. 19.—More than 600 natives were killed by the typhoon which struck Amoy without warning at the end of last week. Outlying districts cannot be communicated with and it is feared great damage has been done there.

One village on the island of Amoy reports that only sixteen out of 200 fishing boats were saved.

Russia's Ex-War Chief **Defends Self at Trial**

Petrograd, Sept. 19.—Witnesses in the trial of General Seukhomlinori, the former Russian minister of war, who is facing a charge of high treason, having concluded their evidence, the general to-day was invited to give any explanation he might wish to make. The former minister appeared exhausted by the long judicial proceedings, Speaking in a weak, tired voice, he endeavored to prove the necessity of dismantling Russian fortresses for which he had given orders. He declared that owing to the conditions of modern warfare the fortresses long had lost all their strategic importance and would only have been traps for the retreating troops.
