MARKET ADVANCES ON BONDS

Gains Up to Three Points Made by Leading Stock; Liberty Bonds Have Firm Undertone

Gains of 1 to almost 3 points were made by such leaders as the steels, coppers, equipments and oils. Rails also rose, though more moderately, leading to an advance of a point. Dealings in the Liberty 3 1/2s were light, with a firm undertone.

BUILDING TAKES DROP IN SEPT.

Nine Permits For \$204,255 Granted; to Start on Open Air School Soon

During September, nine permits were issued for construction work which is to cost \$204,255. One of these permits was for the new plant of the Evans Building and Construction Company now being erected at Third and Reilly streets at a cost of \$200,000, while the remaining eight were for small additions and repairs, to cost \$4,255.
