Insistent calls were made that only the upper stands be reserved and the lower stands thrown open to the populace on the "first come, first served" idea.

This system was finally adopted. Then a new angle arose. Any number of fans refused to take a chance in the belief that vast crowds would be surging toward the turnstiles and that it would be impossible to get a seat. As a result, in 1913, there were any number of vacant seats. But the worst blow came in the second New York game. The Giants had stopped the Red Sox rush on Tuesday and were back in the fight on Wednesday. Weather conditions were normally good. Yet, when the game began, there were exactly 1,200 vacant seats. This defleit was through no lack of interest. The rush for reserved seats and the clamor for tickets had never been greater.

It was merely the old story. Each fan thought the rush would be too great to allow any chance for a seat, the result being that bare spots were visible all through the big stand. Despite the wild clamor for tickets and the loud, plaintive calls from far and wide, 1,200 seats went vacant because each fan was thinking the other fans had clogged all space around the park. This collective drift of fanatical thought shut off at least \$50,-000 receipts.
