Chicago, Oct. 18.—Following a warm welcome home to the champion White Sox team, the players received their share of cash.

They will be called upon to give up some of their earnings because of the war tax on excess profits. All sums over \$6,000 are subject to an eight per cent. tax. This tax, of course, figures on top of the regular income taxes which begin at \$1,000 for each of the single boys and \$2,000 for the married ones.
