Spends Birthday Here While on a Furlough

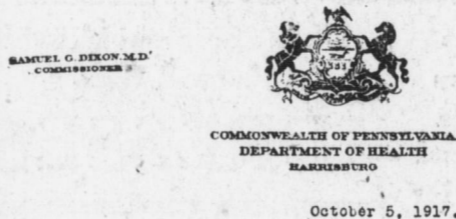
