RALLY DAY AT STEVENS CHURCH

1,200 Are Expected to Be Present at Principal Service

To-morrow will be Rally Day in the Stevens Memorial Church and Sunday school, Thirteenth and Vernon streets. More than usual preparation has been made for the different services to be held in connection with the big Sunday school rally.

Individual Reformers Individual reformers had appeared before who called upon the church to return to the pure teaching of the Scriptures and put aside the inventions of men. They appeared in different parts of Europe: Wycliffe in England; Huss and Jerome in Bohemia; Wessel and John of Wessel in the Lowlands; and Savonarola in Italy. Wycliffe, who was called by the archbishop of Canterbury "a pestilent wretch" for spurning transubstantiation, died a heretic. Huss and Jerome of Prague were burned by the vote of the Council of Constance.
