U. S. to Build \$100,000,000 Ordnance Depot in France

Washington, Oct. 22.—The ordnance division of the War Department has permitted announcement of the letting of a contract for the \$100,000,000 ordnance depot and arsenal to be erected by the United States at its overseas base. All of the labor and special machinery for erection of the plant, as well as the equipment for it when completed, are to be transported to Europe, the allies, and especially the French, being unable to tax their economic forces and supplies.
