kind people know what circumstances I am in. I am very glad to ell
you people that I am the individual
who carried the Stars and Stripes
over the top at Vimy Ridge, April 9,
1917, and I was buried alive later in
the day.
"I have been in this world war for

1917, and I was buried alive later in the day.

"I have been in this world war for a period of two years and a few months—wounded on three occasions and of course, I shed blood each time. I am glad I offered my services for the cause of humanity.

"But, my friends, there is one who writes to me—only my father and I have not heard from him for a matter of five months. He wrote to me about the deed I performed at Vimy Ridge and sent me a picture which appeared in all of the papers throughout the United States. I would venture to say you might have seen it.

"As I am going to ask a favor of you, I hope it will be granted, and that is if you please. Now, could you or would you send me a Field Comfort Box? I feel sure I would be pleased as I have not tasted American cigarets or tobacco for many a day. It would be a good comfort to me, I assure you.
