LAUNCH DRIVE FOR FUND TODAY
Committee to Solicit Y. M. C. A. Contributions Is Making Good Progress

A committee of one hundred men this morning went out soliciting contributions to the Y. M. C. A. and Y. W. C. A. in Steelton, Highspire, Oberlin, Ennau and Bressler.

Reports in some sections at noon today were to the effect that the contributions were coming in large quantities and there were several large sums given.

Committees were given instructions at a meeting in Frey's Hall last evening. About 100 men were in attendance. Quincy Bent, chairman of the local committee, had charge of the meeting.

Among the speakers were Edward Bailey of the campaign committee of central Pennsylvania, Prof. L. E. McGinness, Frank B. Wickham and Quincy Bent.

There are three ways by which contributions to the fund can be made. They are: (1) on a one-time basis; (2) by the subscriber paying half of the amount contributed at once, 25 per cent. January 1, 1918 and the remainder April 1. The contributions will be turned over to the committee on W. H. Nell, president of the People's Bank.

Washington, Nov. 13.—Formal application to make the rate increases caused by the readjustments ordered in the intermountain rate case was presented by the railroads today to the Interstate Commerce Commission.

SHIPPING DAY HELPS TRAFFIC

Penny Reports Increased Speed in Philadelphia Plan; Other Benefits
Less-than-carload freight shipped from Philadelphia, under the new "Shipping Day" or "Sailing Date," plan is moving to destination with more than three times the average speed achieved under the old method of handling.

Net revenues for the 173 roads were \$110,880,310, as compared with \$117,503,474 a year ago. Operating revenues were \$547,121,272, about \$23,000,000 more than last year and operating expenses were \$234,240,962, about \$30,000,000 more than a year ago.

Eastern roads, whose application for higher rates is now pending before the Interstate Commerce Commission, reported net revenue during September of \$43,550,722, as compared with \$44,972,454 last year. Their gross revenues were \$154,408 and expenses were \$110,929,686.

Increased Speed—The increased speed under the "Shipping Day" plan is due to the fact that the cars are being loaded to capacity at the point of origin, thus avoiding the need for re-handling less-than-carload freight at transfer stations.

Williamsport Official Given Local Position

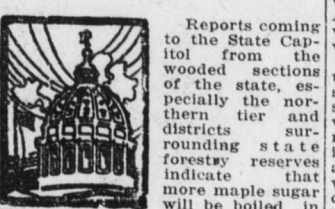

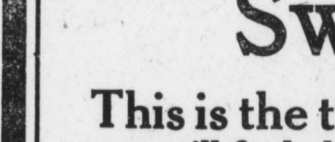

birch trees have been used with profit to meet the demand for the oil. Auditing Bills—Auditing of the mileage accounts of the men who accompanied the Pennsylvania National Guard in the various camps has been started by the Auditor General's department and warrants will soon be drawn in payment. The auditors are allowed ten cents a mile for each mile traveled, but nothing else. A couple of bills close to the 1,000-mile mark have been presented. There were seventy-two commissioners and they have until November 23 to complete returns.

To Make an Example.—Dr. Samuel G. Dixon, State Health Commissioner, has ordered a prosecution instituted in the case of a quarantine violation which had some features new even to veteran health officials in the Department. Several weeks ago the home of Alexander Sloski, who resides in a rural section of Cecil Township, Washington County, was put under quarantine. Sloski had a "To Let" sign placed over the door as a result of the sign and, while the quarantine period was still on, moved out of his own family and household goods and installed the new family, which was found there when the quarantine was lifted.

Palmer to Take Charge.—A Mitchell Palmer, custodian of alien property, has announced that he will take charge of interests of alien claimants in compensation matters and will formally intervene. Mr. Palmer yesterday gave notice to the State Compensation authorities, who have arranged to give him every facility. There are a number of such cases, notably among Austrians, which cases have been held up because of the war.

Buying Last Pike.—Final action will be taken in a few days by the Governor and Attorney General for the purchase of the Duncansville and Newry turnpike, in Blair county. The turnpike is one of the few remaining in the state west of the Susquehanna.

Elevator Rates Up.—The first announcement of increases of rates for shelling corn and for sacking grain and corn to be filed by elevators were entered to-day at the Public Service Commission by two Pittsburgh elevator companies. Rates filed by some electric companies in Western Pennsylvania announce decreased hours in which "off peak" service may be rendered and discontinue all discounts.
