

INVENTORS STUDY U-BOAT PROBLEM

Thousands of Solutions Offered to U. S. Navy Department

Washington, D. C.—Thousands of schemes have been offered by the Navy Department to circumvent the German U-boat, according to a statement authorized by Secretary Daniels.

A wide range of citizens have thus contributed, from the country's distinguished natural scientists and inventors who are almost constantly at work for the Government.

The predominant thought of inventors has turned on methods to combat the menace of the enemy submarine, which give ground information to the submarine, and methods involving new principles, indicating careful thought and study and submitted in concrete form, have been presented to the navy.

"First, methods to accomplish the destruction of submarines, involving detection and destruction after detection.

"Second, means of avoiding submarine attack, involving instructions for merchant vessels, proper handling of vessels, carrier, smoke screens and boxes and other confidential information known to our naval authorities.

"Third, protection of ships against torpedo hits."

London, Nov. 16.—The opening this week of a large new aerodrome at Hanworth Park, near London, marks the completion of an engineering work which involved the excavation of a distance of nearly a mile, of the Wolsey River.

AUSTRIA NOT OFFERED PEACE, SAYS ENGLAND
